Ministry Moment(s)...

Ralph and Mary celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary in the nursing home. Ralph lived there for years and Mary visited him faithfully every day. With a fresh slice of apple pie, a slice of sharp cheddar cheese, and a small thermos of hot black coffee Mary would arrive and treat her husband to a little taste of their life as they had known it. On good days he remembered Mary as she was in her twenties but mostly she had to remind him who she was.

Once upon a time, Ralph was the provider to the bride of his youth and father to his many children. He was a respected member of his community: he helped establish the local veteran's hall for soldiers from his town who were wounded in the line of duty, he coached his sons' little league teams, and he was a founding member of the First Baptist Church. Today, he sits in a wheelchair in the commons room of his nursing home, busied with the local news or Ellen Degeneres Show.

As a former leader in his church, Ralph requests to be a part of our weekly worship service. He requests to read a Scripture passage which I happily accommodate. Ralph and I quickly become more than friends, we are brothers. On days that his mind is good he reveals a desire to share the love of Christ with the people in his home, and when his mind is not so spry, he remarkably has the same desire. I am often surprised that he will forget his wife of 70 years, but he never seems to waiver in his faith and his desire to share it with others.

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I had often taken communion with him on a one-on-one basis. We would go to a private visitation room, and he would share with me the many ways that God had blessed him and his family through-out the years. As our relationship unfolded, I was gently reminded that Ralph, and people like him, is the reason that I was called to this mission. Not because it was through me that Ralph was able to have a connection with our God, but because it was through Ralph that I was able to know God with a deeper and less trivial understanding.

As I fondly remember Ralph, I know for a fact that through my relationship with him God was glorified and both of us were benefitted. I write these little Ministry Moments in an attempt to share with you these most beneficial relationships that I have formed with the residents in hope that you too might consider going into your own local Adult Foster Care or Nursing Home and allow God to bless you with the benefit of developing such a relationship as well. In fact, I think it would be a wonderful idea for your church to adopt your local AFC home as a missionary effort. Please pray about it, talk to your Mission board, and invite me into your church to pitch the concept to your church's leadership.
